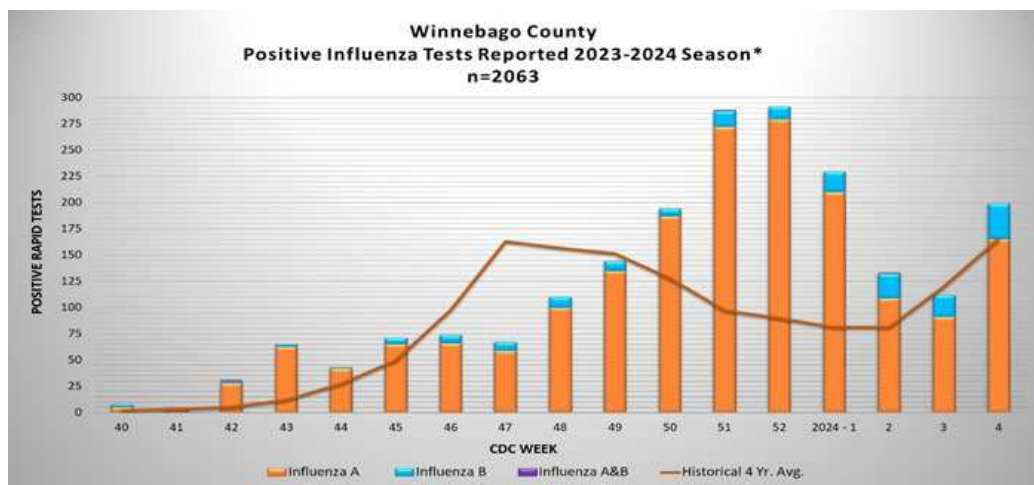
## Communicable Diseases & Conditions In Winnebago County

### RESPIRATORY VIRUSES

The Winnebago County Health Department (WCHD) continued to work with congregate care facilities to provide updated COVID-19 outbreak guidance and opportunities for vaccination of residents and staff through state-supported resources.

For CDC Week 4 (ending Saturday, January 27), Winnebago County had one hundred and ninety-nine (199) positive influenza cases for the 2023-2024 influenza season. The County has seen 26 influenza related ICU admissions this influenza season.

# 2. Diagnose & Investigate

*Investigate, diagnose, and address health problems and hazards affecting the population.*

## Communicable Diseases & Conditions

WCHD continued investigating an active tuberculosis (TB) cases from a congregate care facility. The TB investigation began in November 2023 with the first round of testing, which resulted in six positive



residents and two positive staff. The second round of testing resulted in two positive residents and one positive staff. In all, one hundred and six individuals were tested.

### **Environmental Health**

In January, The Center for Environmental Health Improvement monitored for a food recall on charcuterie samplers due to Salmonella. WCHD utilized social media and the website to help inform the public.

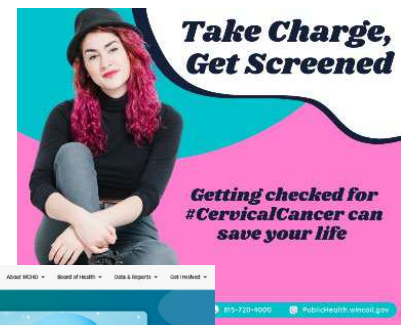


## **3. Communicate**

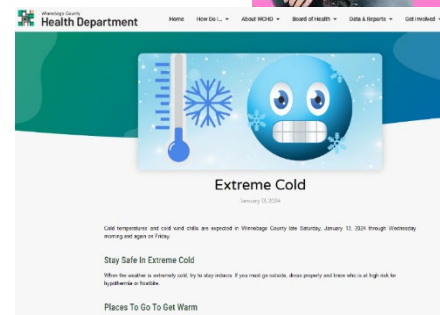
*Communicate effectively to inform and educate people about health, factors that influence it, and how to improve it.*

### **Digital Media Initiatives**

In January, the Winnebago County Health Department (WCHD) continued to share messaging about preventing respiratory viruses and provided a special new year message encouraging the community to stay up to date on vaccines this year. In recognition of it being Radon Awareness Month and Cervical Cancer Awareness Month, WCHD shared messaging encouraging testing for radon gas and encouraging screening for cervical cancer. On February 12, WCHD also recognized Pharmacists for Pharmacists Day.



In response to the extreme cold weather and snow storms that impacted the region in January, WCHD launched a webpage on staying safe in extreme cold weather. The page provided information on dressing appropriately, knowing the warning signs of hypothermia and frostbite, and provided the linked to the City of Rockford page that listed the Warming Centers where people can go to get warm.



## **4. Mobilize Community & Partnerships**

*Strengthen, support, and mobilize communities and partnerships to improve health.*

### **Youth Leadership Council**

Youth Leadership Council decided on hosting a professional development workshops for teens. The event will be called, "What's Next: Preparing For Our Future," and will take place at the Discovery



Center on March 14 from 5pm to 7pm. Topics to be covered include mock interviews and resume reviews.

### **Maternal, Infant, and Child Health Team**

The Maternal, Infant, and Child Health Team (MIGHT) continued to work on planning for a client-centered Respectful Care Event involving all healthcare providers/systems providing prenatal/postnatal care in the community. The Illinois Perinatal Quality Collaborative (ILPQC) is working to support the effort in Winnebago County.

### **Opioid Response**

In January, many Winnebago County Opioid Response Team (WCORT) members presented on their grant submissions to the Winnebago County Community Mental Health Board (WCCMHB) due in January – February. Dr. Martell met with Charles Martin and Chantal Laperle who are with the Advocates for Human Potential, Inc. of the Illinois Regional Care Coordination Agency responsible for the oversight of the [Illinois Opioid Settlements Initiative](#). Dr. Martell will represent the work of the WCORT on the regional coordination committee.

In November, WCHD conducted biweekly opioid overdose prevention outreach at Remedies Renewing Lives. Outreach through organizations such as the Winnebago County Public Safety Building and Winnebago County Court continued as well. Additionally, in January, WCHD provided training to the Carpenters Union and St. Croix Hospice staff.

### **Trauma Informed Community**

WCHD continued to work with the Illinois Coalition on Youth (ICOY), with funding from the Winnebago County Mental Health Board, to conduct trauma training. ICOY presented a conference on January 24 on De-escalation and Vicarious Trauma to nearly one hundred (100) attendees at Midway Village and Museum Center. Additional trainings have been scheduled for 2024 and information is available on the WCHD website [Trauma Trainings page](#).



The **Public Awareness Workgroup** continued to prepare marketing materials for the trauma trainings and update the WCHD webpages. The group is also looking into the Veto Violence messaging from the CDC for ideas for a communications campaign.

The **Training Workgroup** discussed developing trauma trainings for specific groups. The first group identified is those that work with the 0 to 5 populations like daycare facilities. The training may focus on developmental impacts of trauma, coregulation of emotion, and helpful ideas of what to do if working with kids displaying signs of trauma.



The **Transgenerational Trauma Workgroup** discussed the upcoming trainings on Culture and Trauma and Cultural Humility. The group discussed the need to be connected to what is happening in schools. The group is starting to work on an outline of the trainings.

The **Employment Practices Workgroup** is working with ICOY to review the Trauma Informed Proclamation for revision and distribution in 2024.



## 5. Policies and Plans

*Create, champion, and implement policies, plans, and laws that impact health.*

### Strategic Initiatives

The workgroups met in January with the following updates:

- **Assessors** worked with Workforce Development to create a training calendar template and tracking system for all employee tiers.
- **Assurance** continued to attend each of the strategic workgroups and health priority groups to ensure they are on track with their goals and objectives.
- **Collaborators** continued to update, enhance, and categorize their current list of community partners. They shared invitations for Trauma Trainings and are preparing for additional IPLAN outreach.
- **Organizers** researched information about Winnebago County's diverse population to understand and share with all staff their specific health beliefs and customs to ensure meaningful client interactions.
- **Policy Makers** reviewed the New Employee Orientation to ensure it includes health equity and trauma informed information.
- **Reporters** developed messaging to support the IPLAN partner email outreach. In addition, they continued their work on IPLAN messaging and are gathering culturally relevant information for effective communications.
- **Reaccreditation** worked to identify three powers for each organizations who participated in the community partners assessment.
- **Workforce Development** revised the New Employee Orientation to include information on "First Amendment Audits" to prepare staff to interact if approached by an auditor. They also discussed future training needs based on the results of the most recent core competency assessment.

**Public Health Preparedness**

Incident Command was activated for winter storm planning during the second week of January.

WCHD continued to provide flu and COVID-19 vaccines at the clinic.

The Winnebago County Medical Reserve Corps (MRC) was selected as NACCHO Operational Readiness Award (ORA) recipient. The MRC had nine volunteers participate in the January meeting.

**IPLAN & Reaccreditation Updates**

The IPLAN 2025 Community Partner Assessment, concluded in January, yielded ninety-three (93) responses from sixty-nine (69) organizations. The Internal Steering Committee reviewed the preliminary findings, as WCHD moved forward with drafting the final report. Additionally, WCHD prepared for the launch of the Community Health Assessment in early February, which aims to gather residents' insights on the factors influencing their health under the theme share what impacts your health, submit your experience, shape the health of Winnebago County. WCHD is working with the UIC team and community partners to recruit participants for focus groups, planned for April 2024.

All reaccreditation documentation was submitted to PHAB and a reviewer was assigned to WCHD. As WCHD awaits feedback, the Reaccreditation Workgroup was temporarily reassigned to assist with the IPLAN.



## 6. Laws & Regulations

*Utilize legal and regulatory actions designed to improve and protect the public's health.*

The Illinois General Assembly began their 2024 legislative session this month. The Northern Illinois Public Health Consortium (NIPHC) Legislative Committee identified approximately twenty-five (25) bills introduced between the Illinois House of Representatives and Illinois Senate that could have an impact on public health if they become law. NIPHC continues to watch and monitor the progress of the identified bills throughout the current legislative session. The bill filing deadline for the current session is February 9<sup>th</sup> and the Governor's Budget and State of the State is scheduled for February 21<sup>st</sup>.





Records are currently being reviewed for destruction eligibility based on the guidance from the Local Records Commission. During the most current review, Board of Health meeting packets ranging from 2014 – 2016 were determined to be best stored digitally. They have been scanned and filed on the shared drive with the other digitally stored Board of Health packets.

## 7. Equitable Access

*Assure an effective system that enables equitable access to the individual services and care needed to be healthy.*

### **Health Education Services**

The Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) Staff worked toward improving handouts and educational materials for clients by participating in a Illinois Department of Human Services collaborative.

Youth Prevention Education prepared to begin again at RESA Middle School on February 21 and at Flinn Middle School and Johnson Elementary February 8. The Anti-Marijuana and Underage Drinking materials continued to be utilized at Durand Jr. High School, RESA Middle School, and Harlem Middle School.

### **Personal Health Services**

In January, the Better Birth Outcomes Program conducted outreach to the Rockford Rescue Mission and Women's Crisis Center. The High-Risk Infant Follow-Up Program educated NICU staff from one local healthcare system about program. The Illinois Breast Cervical Cancer Program recognized January as Cervical Cancer Awareness Month by sending out information and education to providers and the community. Family Planning staff participated in Title X orientation. Community partners requested Family Planning information to share with their clients.

### **COVID-19 Vaccination Health Equity Initiatives**

COVID-19 tests were provided in the month of January at Remedies, Save-A-Lot, and Washington Park Community Center. In January, the Rapid Community Assessment (RCA) for the PAVE (Partnering for Vaccine Equity) Grant was facilitated at Save-A-Lot grocery store and Washington Park Community Center. The next steps will be to gather the data and determine the best ways to communicate with the identified population.

## 8. Diverse & Skilled Workforce

*Build and support a diverse and skilled public health workforce.*

Positions WCHD is currently recruiting for include:

- Environmental Health Program Inspector
- Case Manager



Three staff from the Center for Environmental Health Improvement (EH staff) have applied to take the Licensed Environmental Health Practitioner exam this summer. Pre-requirements to take the exam include thirty hours of college science courses, three years of experience in the field, and a letter of support from an LEHP peer. This exam covers all aspects of Environmental practices and has less than a sixty percent (60%) pass rate. WCHD strives for excellence in our workforce and to have experts in their field, EH staff are expected to apply and take the exam after three years of employment.

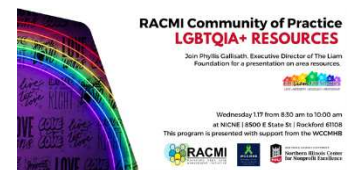
EH staff management took and passed the Illinois pesticide license exam. This will allow WCHD to not only apply solid larvicide, but also train and provide municipal staff with their own larvicide so they can apply when needed. That annual training will take place before the start of the mosquito season.

### Training

In January, all staff completed sexual harassment training.

Some WCHD staff had the opportunity to participate in additional trainings including:

- Ten staff received Heartsaver CPR training
- Center for Personnel Health Services staff attended Family Planning Title X orientation Training
- Two WIC Staff attended a one-day training for Breastfeeding to gain knowledge on other cultures view on breastfeeding and better understand the social determinants of health. The training also discussed how to empower women and increase breastfeeding rates.
- Center for Health Protection Staff attend the Rockford Area Case Management Initiative (RACMI) Community of Practice on January 17, 2024. The Liam Foundation presented on resources, ally-ship, and advocacy to support our program participants.

## 9. Improve & Innovate

### Quality Improvement Initiatives

WCHD continued to implement new Quality Improvement (QI) projects for 2024 with key objective to use QI tools for all projects and align QI initiatives with WCHD's Strategic plan and IPLAN.

## 10. Organizational Infrastructure

*Build and maintain a strong organizational infrastructure for public health.*

### Governmental Organizations

Winnebago County Health Department submitted a three (3) year funding proposal to Winnebago County for Winnebago County Opioid Settlement Funds in the amount of \$475,730.43 to support multiple initiatives including expansion of the Harm Reduction Program and implementation of a hyper-local telehealth model for MAT/MAR in partnership with the University of Illinois College of Pharmacy.

Updates were provided to Winnebago County Board Chairman Chiarelli with routine meetings to restart in February 2024.

### Non-Governmental Organizations

Dr. Martell will be participating on the IVDRS/SUDORS (Illinois Violent Death Reporting System/Statewide Unintentional Drug Overdose Reporting System) Advisory Council convened by the designated data repository for the state of Illinois at Northwestern University.

The Director of Health Protection continued to participate in the Northern Illinois Homeless Coalition as the Chair in addition to providing public health updates for homeless service providers. The Director participated in the annual Point in Time Count on January 22, 2024 to identify the unsheltered homeless living on the streets.

The Director and Supervisor of Health Protection lead the NIPHC STI Subcommittee meeting on January 16, 2024. The committee is working on challenges regarding the reporting of STIs and capturing needed treatment information from the providers.

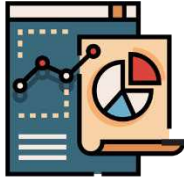
The Center for Health Protection's Sexual Transmitted Infection Prevention Team continued its partnership with Winnebago Juvenile Detention Center in providing a monthly presentation on January 11, 2024, to the young adults on sexual health.





The Director of Policy received an update from the Bridges Out of Poverty Committee on January 29<sup>th</sup>. A Poverty Reduction Strategy Community Event has been scheduled in coordination with Mayor McNamara's and Board Chairman Chiarelli's respective offices for February 28<sup>th</sup>. Center for Environmental Health Improvement staff met with the vendor for a new NSF-certified and State-approved pre-treatment septic system called EZ-Treat. This new product can be suggested as an option for a replacement installation when we need to overcome shallow soil limitations that are observed during our soil boring analysis. Several factors would be necessary for usage, such as limited space, annual maintenance requirements, and "manageable" departmental oversight. This system is State approved which allows the installation to be only six inches to seasonal wetness and only have a limited setback to a private well. The State designed approval documentation is on file so that its specifications can be reviewed in the event these challenges are presented and may be an option for a homeowner.
