



Description of Authority and Activity

- Winnebago County Health Department (WCHD) is a unit of Winnebago County government established under Chapter 111 1/2 Section 20C.
 - Governed by a 12 member Board of Health appointed by the County Chairman with full consent of the County Board.
 - Illinois state certified local health department for Winnebago County covering 14 townships, 9 cities/villages, representing urban, suburban, and rural populations (284,000 residents) in 715 square miles including the City of Rockford.
 - Responsible for:
 - Surveillance, investigation, and containment of communicable/infectious diseases.
 - Enforcement of rules, regulations, and ordinances established to protect the health of the public including environmental health concerns.
 - Assessment of the health of the population including establishment and implementation of plans to address health priorities.
 - Emergency preparedness and response activities to public health events.



 - Violence



Maternal and Child Health Goals and Objectives

- Goal
 - By 2030, increase the development of family infrastructure that supports the optimal development of children in all families, especially families experiencing the negative social determinants of health.
- Objectives
 - Reduce *adverse maternal and child health outcomes, including maternal mortality, severe maternal morbidity, preterm births, infant mortality, and low birth weight*, by 10%.
 - Reduce the *infant mortality rate for Black/African American infants* by 10%.
 - Reduce the percentage of *low birth weight infants in the Black/African American population* by 10%.
 - Reduce the *severe maternal morbidity (SMM) rate in Black/African American women* by 10%.
 - Reduce the percentage of *pregnancies conceived within 18 months of a previous birth* by 10%.

Mental Health Goals and Objectives

- Goals

- By 2030, improve the mental health of the community through promotion of positive coping and self-care skills, resilience, and prevention of serious mental health issues including substance use and associated impacts.

- Objectives

- Decrease the *rate of deaths from opioid overdose*, including fentanyl, by 10%.
- Decrease the *rate of suicide* in Winnebago County by 10%.
- Reduce *disparities in mental health outcomes* (suicides and opiate overdose deaths) by 5%.
- Decrease the *self-report of unhealthy/very unhealthy* to no more than 2%.

Violence Goals and Objectives

- Goal
 - By 2030, decrease the incidence of personal, family, and community violence with targeted focus on areas suffering from unequal rates of violent acts.
- Objectives
 - Reduce the *incidence of firearm related deaths* by a minimum of 5%.
 - Reduce the *domestic violence fatality rate* by a minimum of 5%
 - Reduce the risk of *reported substance use in adolescence* by 20%.
 - Reduce the *incidence of bullying behavior* by 50%.
 - Increase the *rate of gun lock distribution* to the three communities with the highest social vulnerability index (61101, 61104, and 61102) by 20%.



MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING WITH WINNEBAGO COUNTY FOR DISTRIBUTION OF GUN LOCKS

PURPOSE

The purpose of this Memorandum of Understanding (hereinafter referred to as "MOU") between the Winnebago County Health Department, 555 North Court Street, Rockford, IL 61103 (hereinafter, referred to as "WCHD") and the _____ (hereinafter referred to as "PARTNER") is to develop a program for the distribution of gun locks provided by WCHD by the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) to individuals served by PARTNER.

RECITALS

WHEREAS, WCHD is the nationally accredited, Illinois state certified local health department for Winnebago County, including the City of Rockford; AND

WHEREAS, WCHD conducted a community health assessment and identified community health improvement priorities for Winnebago County in the 2023 Illinois Plan for Local Assessment of Needs (IPLAN), which include mental health, violence prevention, and maternal and child health; AND

WHEREAS, reducing the number of suicides by 10% was established as a goal of the IPLAN; AND

WHEREAS, national statistics related to firearms show the following:

- the death rate from firearm suicides is 7.9/100,000 with over half of all suicide deaths occurring with a firearm;
- adolescents are at higher risk of suicide when there is a firearm in the home;
- approximately 1,300 children under 18 years of age die from firearms annually;
- one (1) in three (3) families with children have at least one gun in the home; and
- nearly 40% of unintentional shooting deaths among children ages 11 – 14 years occur in the home of a friend; AND

WHEREAS, securing firearms with gun locks has demonstrated effectiveness in reducing the risk of injury or death due to the unintentional use of firearms; AND

WHEREAS, WCHD has received gun locks from IDPH to provide to the community at no cost; AND

WHEREAS, PARTNER would like to offer gun locks for distribution to clients/families served by PARTNER.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the above Purpose and Recitals and of the mutual covenants and other consideration contained in this MOU, the Parties agree as follows:

- I. **Incorporation of Preamble Recitals:** The above purpose and recitals are incorporated herein by reference as though fully set forth.

WCHD Agrees:

- To provide PARTNER with requested number of gun locks including accompanying educational materials in English/Spanish and other languages as requested by PARTNER.
- To document the following as required by IDPH:
 - Number of gun locks distributed;
 - Any reported "saves" or "positive outcomes" associated with a gun lock that has been provided;
- To meet with PARTNER designated staff to review and provide feedback on the gun lock distribution program on a quarterly, or as needed, basis.

PARTNER Agrees:

- To develop internal policies/protocols for PARTNER agency related to the provision of gun locks to its clients/families.
- To provide gun locks and related WCHD educational materials to clients/families based on internal policies/protocols.
- To document distribution of gun locks by zip code.
- To provide gun locks at no cost to clients/families.
- To provide monthly reports to WCHD containing the number of gun locks distributed by PARTNER.
- To inform WCHD of community events where PARTNER will be distributing gun locks.
- To have WCHD designated staff to review and provide feedback on the gun lock distribution program on a quarterly, or as needed, basis.

Entirety and Agreement:

This MOU shall be for a period of two (2) years from the date of execution and may be extended by written agreement of the Parties. This MOU may be terminated or amended by either party giving the other party thirty (30) days written notice. The replacement source to be identified should the gun locks cease to be provided by IDPH will be governed by the laws of the State of Illinois.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN WINNEBAGO COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT AND WINNEBAGO COUNTY COURTHOUSE

PURPOSE

The purpose of this Memorandum of Understanding (hereinafter referred to as "MOU") between Winnebago County Court House (hereinafter referred to as "Community Site"), located at 400 West State Street, Rockford, IL 61101, and the Winnebago County Health Department (hereinafter referred to as "WCHD"), located at 555 N. Court Street, Rockford, IL 61103 (collectively the "Parties"), is to set forth the Parties' understanding with respect to the implementation of Harm Reduction Program (HRP) services to be held at the Community Site.

WHEREAS, WCHD is the nationally accredited, Illinois state certified local health department for Winnebago County, including the City of Rockford; AND

WHEREAS, Mental Health, including the reduction of opioid overdose deaths by 30%, was identified as a priority health concern for Winnebago County through the most recent IPLAN (Illinois Plan for Local Assessment of Needs - Community Health Assessment/Community Health Improvement Plan); AND

WHEREAS, WCHD has led the Winnebago County Opioid Response Team comprised of community partners representing substance use prevention, treatment, stigma reduction, rescue, and recovery services; AND

WHEREAS, the WCHD Drug Overdose Prevention Program (DOPP) has provided education on naloxone administration and supplied naloxone to individuals and community agencies to expand the provision of this life-saving intervention to potential victims of opioid overdose; AND

WHEREAS, there were 165 deaths reported by the Winnebago County Coroner in 2022 attributable to drug overdose; AND

WHEREAS, WCHD is committed to preventing the transmission of communicable diseases associated with opioid use disorders including, but not limited to, Hepatitis, Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs), and HIV; AND

WHEREAS, the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) identifies Harm Reduction as an evidence-based approach to engage individuals who use drugs to prevent overdose and infectious disease transmission, improve physical, mental, and social well-being and engage individuals in healthcare including substance use and mental health disorder treatment; AND

III. Winnebago County Health Department (WCHD) Agrees:

A. To provide HRP services at the mutually agreed date(s) and time(s) in coordination and collaboration with the Community Site and provide prompt notification of any changes to the schedule.

B. To provide communication and outreach regarding availability of HRP services at the Community Site.

C. To provide Disease Intervention Specialist (DIS) staffing required for operation of the HRP event.

D. To screen individuals to determine eligibility for voluntary participation in HRP services.

E. To provide all supplies required for the HRP services as determined by WCHD at no charge to Community Site or participants, including but not limited to:

1. Safer Substance Use Testing Kit (fentanyl and xylazine test strips)
2. Naloxone (Narcan®) nasal spray
3. Safe injection supplies including syringes
4. Gun locks
5. Condoms
6. Sexually Transmitted Infection (STI)/HIV Testing Resources
7. HIV PrEP (pre-exposure prophylaxis) Medication Resources
8. Contact information to access HRP Services outside of the Community Site
9. Referrals for services not provided through the HRP.

E. To return the Community Site premises to substantially the same condition at the conclusion of the HRP services, ordinary wear and tear excepted.

F. To sanitize all hard surfaces used in the HRP services at the Community Site at the conclusion of the event.

G. To ensure that all biohazardous waste is removed from the Community Site in accordance with all applicable laws and regulations.

H. To designate a point of contact for communications related to this MOU.

igrow pairs families with one of our four collaborative home visiting agencies based on each family's needs and schedules. These agencies are: **Easter Seals Teen Family Support**, **City of Rockford Early Head Start**, **YWCA/La Voz Latina**, **Harlem School District 122**, **Children's Home + Aid Doula**, and **Rockford Public Schools Early Childhood Program**. Home visitors emphasize practical parenting skills as well as family bonding before birth and as your child grows up.

Home visitors can:

- Serve as the family's main point of contact.
- Answer questions about feeding and sleeping habits.
- Provide parenting tips to match your child's needs.
- Help your child prepare for Preschool.
- Show you activities to help your child develop and grow.
- Connect you to community services.

Home Visiting Q & A

How much does it cost?

Home visiting services through igrow are completely free.

Who can enroll?

Anyone who is pregnant or has a child up to 2.5 years old can enroll, but you stay in the program until your child turns 3. The program can also work with older siblings to transition them into a preschool program.

What happens after signing up for home visiting?

If you have not already filled a Home Visiting Inquiry form out you will be contacted the Coordinated Intake Worker from Winnebago County Health Department to complete this process. If you have already filled the Home Visiting Inquiry form out then you will be contacted by a home visitor from one of our partner agencies. All information given is strictly confidential.

How often do the home visitors come?

Some programs come weekly for 60-90 minutes and others come every other week for an hour. This varies by the program.

How long does my child and myself participate in home visiting?

The home visits last until your child turns 3 and is enrolled in preschool. If you have more than one child in the program than they last until the youngest turns 3.

What are the qualifications of the home visitors?

All home visitors have specific training's that they need to complete before they come to your home. They also need to have a bachelor's degree and most have a background in early childhood development.

Can I quit the program if I don't like it?

The program is completely voluntary so you can choose to end it at any time, but we feel confident that you will love it! But if you don't, please talk to a supervisor about how the program can better meet your needs.





Levy Funding



- Levy funding = **\$8.11/resident**
 - Cost of 2019 Clark County Washington **measles outbreak**
 - \$47,479 per case (72 cases)
 - Public Health response = \$2.3 million
 - Productivity losses = \$1.0 million
 - Direct medical costs = \$76,000
 - Total = \$3.4 million Source: <https://pediatrics.aappublications.org/content/147/4/e2020027037>
 - Cost of **single foodborne illness outbreak** impacting 5 – 250 persons
 - \$3968 to \$1.9 million for fast-food restaurant
 - \$6330 to \$2.1 million for fast-casual restaurant
 - \$8030 to \$2.2 million for casual-dining restaurant
 - \$8273 to \$2.6 million for fine-dining restaurant
 - Cost of **one dose of influenza vaccine** ranges from **\$24.71 to \$67.34**

Revenue Concerns

- Lack of targeted funding resources to address Winnebago County health priorities.
- Maintaining competitive fees for Environmental Health to recoup cost while supporting compliance.
- Continued tolling agreement with Waste Haulers impacting inspection fees.
- Economic concerns related to inflation, tariffs, supply chain, and labor shortages.
- Uncertain economic picture.

Expense Concerns

- Increase in Personnel Costs
 - Health insurance cost increases
 - Routine longevity increases
 - Turnover of professional staff
 - Salaries of experienced replacement professional staff
 - Maintaining competitive salary structure
- Information Technology (IT) Support Costs
 - Communicable Disease control
 - Environmental Health inspections
 - Timekeeping System for grant cost allocations
 - Electronic Health Record
 - Biologics monitoring system
 - Qualtrics.

Expense Concerns

- Increasing contractual costs for services and supplies.
- Implementation of plans to address health priorities.
- Public Health Emergencies
 - Communicable disease control (e.g. vector-borne, food-borne illness, tuberculosis, vaccine-preventable, emerging infectious disease)
 - Emerging concerns (e.g. drug overdoses, housing, hoarding)
 - Environmental health (e.g. aging infrastructure, lead, blighted properties, wells/septic systems, PFAS contamination, air quality)
 - Natural disaster (e.g. flood, tornado, extreme cold/heat)
 - Bioterrorism event

Expense Concerns

- Waiving of standard fees for legal notices, asbestos inspections, and utility disconnections for properties to be demolished with host fees.
- Securing vacant/abandoned properties that have been condemned.
- Expenses associated with complex sampling and testing to address environmental health concerns such as PFAS.
- Reductions in AmeriCorps funding limiting access to support at local level.
- Implementation of Community Health Improvement Plan Priorities for 2025 – 2030.
- Maintaining Capital Plan for aging mechanics, structure, windows, etc. at 555 North Court.

Strategies to Address Concerns

- Increase reliance on automation where possible to augment and support professionals.
- Continued purchasing alignment with Winnebago County.
- Review and implementation of fee structures for programs to more closely recoup costs.
 - Update to Winnebago County Ordinances regarding permit fees.
- Focus on identification of new and sustainable funding sources.
- Explore and capture additional revenue sources including Video Gaming tax, Casino tax, Cannabis tax, and Real Estate levy from Winnebago County to support public health.

Strategies to Address Concerns

- Continued implementation of control on grants to minimize levy support except for core public health services.
- Ongoing participation and partnership with community entities to support community health priorities and leverage resources.
- Application for AmeriCorps Program support as available.
- Continued review and alignment of resources with Strategic Plan Goals and Health Improvement Priorities.
- Expand educational and internship opportunities.
- Review of clinical services and reimbursement from public and private insurance providers.

Strategies to Address Concerns

Public Health Emergency Reserve maintained to address public health emergencies such as communicable diseases, environmental health issues, or other public health emergencies.



FY2026 Organizational Structure




